Bürgervorsteher (people's representative) Peter Empen congratulated the Verein on its anniversary. "Looking back", he said, "it was the right decision to put the twinning work on a private basis ten years ago". There was a feeling that the whole process would otherwise be subject to town politics. But the real work was already being done by schools, choirs, clubs and other organisations as well as by churches and individual people. The connection to the twin towns reached a different level and a higher quality through the *Verein*, and it had achieved far more through its creative Committee and its active members than could be done by committees which were concerned with politics. and friendships now exist and they promise great things for the future", he said.

Georg Weßler, former Chairman of the Verein and one of its founding members, talked about its ten-year history. "We looked to the future with optimism", he said, "and we have had a very interesting time". The goal was to establish friendly relations and to strengthen contribute and thus to international understanding. The Verein had had an extensive programme of education, including cultural programmes and language courses; there were currently 51 members, including two from Kidderminster. In particular the youth exchanges had proved a great success; the Husum Fire Brigade's youth section had regular and intensive contacts with their opposite numbers in Heiligenstadt. Thursday - another hot day! Escorted by Nathan Carroll from KD8, our visitors were guided on a hike that took them to Bewdley via Trimpley and Habberley Valley, arriving in time for fish and chips. They had time for a look around Bewdley before their planned visit to the Museum, which included demonstrations of rope making and clay pipe making. Then they were on the move again,

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hiking back to Rhydd Covert for a series of activities at 6 pm. Following their long day, the evening provided the opportunity to have time at leisure; back at the scout hut the KD8 Executive Committee had provided a leisurely buffet, with time to meet new people from KD8 and the Kidderminster District Scouts. Conversation went on late into the evening.

Friday started early with a trip on the Severn Valley Railway to Bridgnorth, taking in the engine house at Highley; just enough time to visit High Town in Bridgnorth and buy some souvenirs before heading back to the station



and Kidderminster. By the late afternoon the temperature had dropped a little, so the walk down to the final event of the day, a trip round the Town Hall was not too arduous. There Charles Talbot gave us a colourful tour,

explaining things in both German and English. The visit to the Court Room, with lurid details of past trials and punishments, went down a treat. The early evening gave time for some relaxation; one group visited the Wyre Forest Glades for a swim, while others returned to the scout hut for leisure time and to prepare the evening meal.

Saturday brought another early start; departure for Biblins Campsite in the Forest of Dean saw the German coach and several KD8 vehicles heading off in convoy, and 90 minutes later we (KD8) were entering the site from the English side of the Welsh border, while the coach was wending its way along a 2.5 mile logging track to a point on the Welsh side, next to the suspension bridge that links to the site. What a way to start the camp! Setting up camp and preparing the main meal of the day were the priorities for the rest of Saturday.

Sunday - very hot! Team games were organised for mixed groups of Husum and Kidderminster scouts, and the abundance of water (and the process of getting wet) was important for keeping cool! After a day of such activities the scouts had to do some wood cutting, in order to cook their evening meal on open wood fires. The younger cubs and scouts had had practice sessions at the scout hut to prepare them for camp cooking; over the weekend everyone took part in cooking on several occasions. Sunday evening was our first camp-fire, with traditional songs from both groups.

On Monday we split into several activity groups, which went their separate ways to enjoy kayaking on the River Wye or to take part in a caving expedition; in the afternoon the groups swapped over.

Tuesday saw the whole camp making a trip to the "Big Pit", a coal mine museum at Blaenafon. There were many surprises underground for the youngsters, with tales of the past about very young children working in the darkness for many hours at a time. On the way back to Biblins camp-site we spent some time in Abergavenny - time for some Welsh presentbuying!

Wednesday and Thursday again saw groups of scouts heading off in different directions. The

IN MEMORIAM PAM CUNNINGHAM

It is with great sadness that we have to report the death of one of our long-standing supporters, Pam Cunningham. Pam was the founder and Musical Director of the Kidderminster Valentines ladies' choir, and, as

a devout Catholic, also joined in some of the visits of the churches group in Kidderminster and Husum.

Pam came with husband Alan to Kidderminster from her native Wales in 1971, and trained as a teacher at Shenstone College, subsequently teaching at three schools in this area.

Pam's choir started small, but grew to prominence in the Kidderminster area, helping to raise thousands of pounds for charity and hosting choral events at the Town Hall, which involved choirs from around the Midlands. Under her leadership the choir sang at Symphony Hall in Birmingham and the Royal Albert Hall in London, as well as in Husum.

FROM THE COMMITTEE

The Committee met on November 26, and received reports from a number of groups, as well as news of progress with other groups that were planning to become involved. Some of these reports are the subject of articles elsewhere in this edition of the Newsletter.

The cost of purchasing crocus corms for planting on further sites in the town, which was a matter for concern at the previous meeting, has been met in full; generous donations have been received from Councillors Fran Oborski, Marcus Hart and Mike Kelly, as well as from the Lions Club, Baxter College, residents of Farfield, the

District Scouts and Rotary; the profit from the Quiz Night (\pounds 321) and from sales of cards and tote bags (\pounds 34) was also put to this purpose. Planting had taken place at Habberley, the Police Station and Chester Road, and at least three other sites were awaiting work.

There were discussions about the possibility of involving visiting Husumers in a commemoration service marking the beginning of the First World War, and about the celebration in 2015 of sixty years of links between Husum and Kidderminster.

The Committee met again on February 11, and updates on a number of visits and other arrangements were noted. Plans for the commemoration of the start of the First World War were discussed; there will be a "Service for Peace" at St. Mary's Church on Sunday August 3, and a Vigil in Brinton Park at 10.30 pm. on Monday August 4. Further plans are being made and will be reported later. A German Film Evening was also planned (see details in this Newsletter).

The Committee will meet again on May 14. If members have matters that they would like the Committee to discuss they are invited to contact the Secretary, Hilary Boyle.
