From the Editor

Once again our apologies for the late appearance of this Newsletter – but on this occasion it means that a number of reports from recent events can be included. Kidderminster's Crocus Project

Every Spring six million crocuses burst into flower in Husum's castle park, creating a magical purple carpet of blooms. The crowning of the Crocus Queen and the festival around this is a massive tourist attraction. Whilst we cannot aspire to this, the Twinning Association wants to enhance Kidderminster with some Spring displays of Husum's purple crocuses, especially at the approaches to the town.

Our aims are: to make Kidderminster more attractive; to involve as many people as possible in the project, thus allowing ownership (and hopefully reduce vandalism) of the planting sites, and increase civic pride generally;



to raise awareness of Twinning activities and increase participation throughout the community - we want to keep our very long and strong links with Husum going!

So far seven sites have been finalised, and there are more under discussion:

Broadwaters Park had its first planting in September 2011 and the Friends have plans for local groups of all ages to enlarge this into two large drifts of flowers for 2013;

Husum Way, Wyre Forest School (Stourminster) entrance and Burcher Green will all be organised by Comberton & Offmore Action Group;

Spennells & Aggborough Residents' Group will plant at the Hoobrook War Memorial and their Youth Group will provide "muscle" for other groups;

St George's Park – Friends of the Park will also plant in the Autumn;

The area around Richard Baxter's statue, near St. Mary's Church, has been re-landscaped by Wyre Forest District Council and will have a show of Husum crocuses next Spring.

We are very grateful to the Friends' Groups and other groups, to the staff of the District and County Councils, and to the many others who have co-operated to start this project off in such a positive way.

Eine leibhäftige Märchenprinzessin – a truly fairytale Princess

This is a translation of an article that appeared in the Husumer Nachrichten on the Monday after Husum's Crocus Festival.

The weather had deteriorated somewhat for the proclamation of the *Krokusblütenkönigin* (Crocus Queen) and the sun had no chance to break through the thick clouds. However, people flocked in droves to Husum's Crocus Festival. They came from Germany, of course, but some also travelled from Denmark. The car licence plates as well as the many dialects left no doubt of this. All wanted to see the purple wonder in the Park and to let the camera record it for all time, or at least for the family photo album.

The Rödemis marching band and the "Søderjyske guard" from Aabenraa in Denmark gave a musical frame to the first official appearance of the new Krokusblütenkönigin, Sandra Weber, and on the steps of the old town hall, at 11 am. the Chairman of the Commercial Association, Peter Cohrs, announced the new Queen. In addition to "royalty" from other German towns there was a truly fairytale princess - the Kidderminster Carnival Queen, Jessica Homan – who had travelled from her English home town. Husum's "Crocus Partnerstadt", Düsseldorf, had also sent its ambassadors, Irmgard Lür and the Honorary President of the "Association Pro Düsseldorf", Hans-Otto Christiansen, who is a native of Husum.

The Crocus Queens Sina Heinrich and her successor Sandra Weber both sounded very excited as they responded to the announcement by Peter Cohrs, who gave the microphone first to Uwe Schmitz, saying that he had heard, when Herr Schmitz was standing for the office of *Bürgermeister* of Husum, that "he has a soft spot for the monarchy". Uwe Schmitz cheerfully caught the ball and countered that the monks had brought the crocuses to Husum to cultivate saffron, but that there is also the "modern theory", that it was in fact the Husum traders, who wanted to bring visitors to the town and could "earn a *Taler*" by promoting the crocus wonder. "But over the weekend we shall uphold the monarchy here", said Schmitz and he wished success to the Festival, as well as to everyone who was there. "We have earned Spring", he said.

A touching climax to the enthronement was the farewell speech by Queen Sina. She said that she could look back on a beautiful year; "the children have often asked me what I do when the crocuses aren't in bloom; my answer has been that I acted as a purple splash of colour for the town" - a statement which was rewarded with great applause. Then Sina handed the Crown to her successor, Sandra, who said that she was looking forward very much to her time in office and promised to be a worthy representative of the *Stormstadt*.

After completing the Royal duties the Queens hurried



to the *Schloss* (Castle) Park to meet their "subjects". Around the *Marktplatz* and the Park craftsmen offered their goods. The sunny Sunday attracted more people who joined the natural spectacle to take a stroll among the stalls. Peter Cohrs was very satisfied that "so many people have found their way to Husum". Many tens of thousands of visitors experienced Husum at its most colourful on Saturday and Sunday. Herr Cohrs was also pleased that most Husum businesses responded to the call for Sunday shopping - even if the weather was almost too good for a shopping spree! "The shops were full, and I've seen only happy faces", Cohrs said. The Crocus Festival is a great advertisement for Husum and let's hope that everyone who has visited this year can journey safely.

Our Guests in Husum

With big hugs, and with the promise of "See you again!" the ninth meeting between Christians of various denominations from Kidderminster and Husum came to an end. For five days, ten people from the British town were hosted by the *Stormstadt*, with old friendships being renewed and new contacts being made, and with Holy Communion being celebrated together.

Highlights were the sermons preached by Owain Bell in *St. Marienkirche* (St. Mary's Church) and by Rose Lawley in the *Friedenskirche* (Peace Church). Members of both congregations said that their words were practical and down-to-earth. The guests themselves were particularly impressed by the *Bahnhofsmission* (Railway Mission), through which the former *Bürgermeisterin* (Mayor), Ursula Belker, conducted them on Sunday afternoon. In the Station Mission, she said, homeless people and travellers would find not only a kind word and warm soup, but also unconditional respect: "they are not our customers or our clients, they are our guests".

The programme consisted of sightseeing, culture and meetings; hosts and guests joined in visits to the Viking Museum at Hedeby and to the Cathedral in Schleswig. On Saturday the Crocus Festival was the centre of attention, and in the evening there was the



opportunity to attend a concert. The last evening finally brought together the Churches group, Husum's twinning association, and Kidderminster's Carnival Association. The Carnival Queen from Kid-



derminster was a suitably royal personage, and her mother, who accompanied the 15year-old, endured good-natured banter as the "Queen Mum" of the day.

The focus for the group was on coming together and discussion. Many of the group have known each other for years, but others were there for the first time. One concern that came to the surface was

how these encounters could work in the future. "We have one thing in common," said Dean Emeritus Manfred Kamper on the first evening, "we are all grandparents!" Everyone agreed that it would be good if younger people could join in and could carry on this valuable contact.

My first visit to Husum

Here are some extracts from a long article that Revd. Rose Lawley wrote for St. Mary's Parish Magazine.

I have been here in Kidderminster for five years now and almost from the beginning Ray Harrowing has been trying to persuade me to go to Husum; well this year he succeeded and I'm glad he did!

A Violinist visits Husum

Our stay in Husum was all too short, but the reception we were given was so warm and welcoming that we hope to return in the near future and be able to arrange to stay in Husum for longer than 20 hours!
